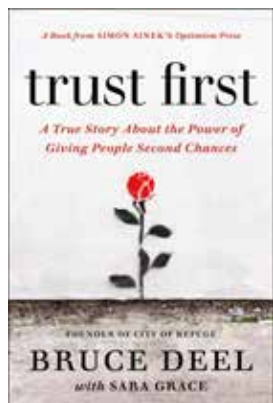

Homeless Not Hopeless

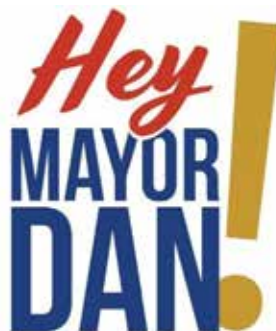

Narwhal's Crafted



Summertime calls for refreshing beverages! Did you know there's a frozen cocktail bar right in your backyard? Narwhal's Crafted makes all their frozen drinks from scratch and their nautical aesthetic makes for a unique and relaxing place to 'chill' with your friends.

Brad Merten and Brandon Holzhuetter are co-owners of Narwhal's Crafted and have known each other since grade school. Before going into frozen cocktails, Brandon was working at an accounting firm while Brad worked at a restaurant. Eventually, they decided to go into business together and began to develop their own concept.

"What two guys that are friends in high school don't wanna open a bar?" says Brad. "With Narwhal's, we try to change the perception of what a frozen cocktail can and should be."

The first Narwhal's Crafted opened in Midtown St. Louis in 2016 and just three years later, they opened their second location at the Streets of St. Charles. The key to their success is they make everything in-house from scratch.

Behind the frozen cocktail machines is a full kitchen where employees are constantly busy making fresh tinctures, purees, and ingredients for their cocktails. Each time you visit Narwhal's Crafted, there is always something different on the menu. New cocktails are introduced every three months to keep things fun and fresh.

"We like to play around with cocktails and do new things," says Brandon. "The idea was to be able to do things that other people haven't done before and also be able to taste the difference in quality of the ingredients that go into the drink," says Brandon.

Examples of their popular drinks include the Chocolate Mudslide, Strawberry Basil Lemonade, Zombie, and Peach Moscow Mule. While known for their frozen cocktail, they also offer an extensive beer list, craft and local, as well as draft cocktails. During the colder months, they sell hot cocktails, such as a Mexican Hot Chocolate or warm sangria.

Walking your furry friend? Not a problem! Narwhal's Crafted is dog-friendly. With their inclusion of the 'Pup Cup', you can enjoy your own frozen treat while your pal enjoys theirs.

Last but not least, you might be wondering: why the Narwhal?

"The Narwhal is an arctic, cold animal. It's unique and that's kind of how we describe ourselves," says Brad.

Ride the Charley

Need a ride in the City of Saint Charles? We've got you covered.

The Charley is a curb-to-curb transportation service provided by our Public Works Department. What does curb-to-curb mean? If you are a City resident, you can reserve a ride with the Charley to pick you up and take you to another Saint Charles location for only 50 cents.

This service is perfect for senior citizens or disabled residents who may not have access to reliable transportation, but it's also available to all ages.

"We introduced this service back in March 2020 when the County's "stay-at-home" order was given," says Daryl Hampel from Public Works. "Our former fixed routes throughout the City were suspended and a request-for-transportation system for senior and disabled riders was implemented to assist them getting to various destinations during lockdown."

In August 2020, the previous transportation system was officially eliminated and replaced with St. Charles City Transit, introducing two new route services: the Charley and Ride STC.

While the City's Commuter "Ride STC" shuttle provides great transport throughout the City of Saint Charles and to the St. Louis Metro, not everyone can make it to a bus stop. The in-town Charley allows public transportation for any and all walks of life.

"The Charley provides an enhanced level of convenience. It saves times for residents and

also eliminates the wasting of resources by City buses driving fixed routes with very few passengers."

Rides on the Charley must be scheduled at least 24 hours in advance and can be reserved as far as a week ahead. Senior and disabled riders are asked to reserve their ride at least 48 hours before. In efforts to adhere to COVID regulations, riders are asked to wear a mask and social distance while on the bus.

Please note that this service is not available to those who reside outside the City of Saint Charles and the Charley bus will not travel to any location outside City limits.

Not Today, Mosquitoes

Excited that it's summer?!
So are mosquitoes.

There are approximately 50 species of mosquitoes in the state of Missouri and all are known as carriers of diseases, such as malaria, yellow fever, and heartworm in dogs. The City of Saint Charles has a mosquito control program in place to keep its residents safe from these dangers.

Mosquitoes are known to lay eggs in very small areas of water, including rain gutters, pet bowls, and small ponds. Public Works uses pesticide tablets to treat areas of standing water in City right-of-ways. These small tabs dissolve in water and are designed specifically to attack mosquito larvae.

"It's a proven fact that it will not harm anything other than larvae," says Daryl Hampel from Public Works. It will not harm dogs, birds, or other animals. "Mosquitoes won't lay eggs in a moving creek. They'll lay in a little puddle next to the creek and they can lay thousands of them."

All public streets in the City of Saint Charles are also sprayed every two weeks to treat adult mosquitoes with an ultra-low volume fogger. This EPA-approved pesticide is a low-odor product that affects the nervous systems of mosquitoes, flies, and gnats.

Many other flying insects, such as bees, return to their hives by the early evening hours and, because of this, Public Works

does not begin spraying until later in the evening. Only a thimble of chemical is used per acre of property and is designed to spread out 200 feet behind the fogger in all directions.

While spraying this product, Public Works trucks drive at or below 10 miles an hour, spraying each street only once. As a courtesy, drivers will not spray areas where people or animals are outside; however, the fog has no effect on humans or other animals. Please keep in mind, while the sprayer may be disengaged, the motor will still be running.

Residents may choose to opt out of this service. In order to do so, please call our Public Works Department at 636-949-3363. Public Works also has a list of registered beehives in our area and these locations are not sprayed. If you maintain a beehive, please register it to FieldWatch.com or call Public Works.

Treating adult mosquitoes is only a temporary solution – elimination of breeding sites while they are still in the water is much more effective.

SHINING A LIGHT

U.S. Air Force Staff Sgt. Elizabeth Lambert

Less than 30 enlisted Airmen have flown over Whiteman Air Force Base in the B-2 Spirit Stealth Bomber plane. Only ONE of them is female and she is from the City of Saint Charles!

U.S. Air Force Staff Sergeant Elizabeth Lambert was recently awarded the Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force Thomas N. Barnes Award. This award names the best dedicated crew chief in the Air Force for the year and upwards of 200 prospective awardees are nominated by their leadership.

“I nominated Sergeant Lambert for this award because she embodies everything a dedicated crew chief is supposed to,” said U.S. Air Force Senior Master Sergeant Andrew Myers.

Her commitment also caught the attention of her previous aircraft commander, Major James Powers.

“Her dedication to the mission is something I admire every day,” said U.S. Air Force Major James Powers. “Not only is she dominating at her job, but also as a front line supervisor.”

Lambert started her career back in 2013. One of her many goals was to be named dedicated crew chief and have her name painted on her own jet, which she has now accomplished. To achieve these goals, she reported facing many challenges of her own, including career setbacks and working in a male dominated career field.

“I became ‘one of the guys’ and people slowly warmed up to the idea that I am completely competent and will always go out of my way to make sure that everything gets done in an efficient way,” said Lambert. “It took me about two and a half years, but I think that I finally got there!”

In order to retain the title of dedicated crew chief, Airmen must continually uphold their jet’s readiness. Sergeant Lambert worked 12 hour days for over a year to learn as much as she could about her jet. She was also presented an incentive flight in the stealth bomber for achieving this award, an opportunity less than 20 Airmen have had.

“This is a once in a lifetime opportunity,” said Lambert. “I am the first female enlisted crew chief to fly in the B-2 Spirit and that is incredible. I love that I get to be a part of history as someone that other girls can look up to and know that if I can do this, they can too.”

JEWISH FESTIVAL

Festival to Highlight Jewish Life and Culture in St. Charles County

This summer, St. Charles County will celebrate its diversity through a new music and cultural event, the St. Charles Jewish Festival. The festival will offer a unique recognition of the music, traditions and foods that Jewish people celebrate and enjoy.

The festival was announced this week by its organizers, the Chabad Jewish Center of St. Charles County and the St. Charles Jewish Family Network. The festival will be held Sunday, August 15 from 12:00 to 3:30 p.m.

The festival will join the line-up of other cultural festivals in the County with a focus on highlighting Jewish life and traditions, and is geared to be enjoyed by a broad audience. The festival will be held outdoors at the Foundry Art Centre at 520 N. Main Center.

Headlining the music portion of the festival will be a folk-rock duo known as the “Rogers Park Band,” which specializes in Chasidic Jewish folk music. Their song lyrics, which are in both English and Hebrew, bring an upbeat message of love and joy. Additional local musicians and talent will be announced in the coming weeks.

The festival will also include family entertainment and traditional Jewish foods, including kosher deli and potato knishes. Admission, music, and kids activities will be at no charge. The food will be for sale.

“The goal is to bring the County together for an upbeat Jewish experience,” said Bassy Landa, who directs the Chabad Jewish Center of St. Charles County together with her husband, Rabbi Chaim Landa, and also directs the St. Charles Jewish Family Network.

“What better way to come together as a community,” she said. “This festival is open to all, and there will be something to enjoy for everyone; there is no charge to attend.”

According to the most recent community study, there are nearly 6,000 Jews in St. Charles County and 41 percent of Jewish households in the County have at least one child living at home. The St. Charles Jewish Festival follows the first such gathering in 2019, when a group of about 100 people gathered in a nearby park. Organizers saw potential to build on its success and decided to make the festival a much larger, open-to-all, community-wide event.

The festival will highlight a message of optimism and positivity, as taught by the Rebbe—Rabbi Menachem M. Schneerson, of righteous memory, the most influential rabbi in modern history. “The Rebbe taught us to live positively and to recognize opportunity for growth in every situation,” said Bassy Landa. “We’re excited to share this message as our community continues to grow and blossom.”

Throughout the year, the Chabad Jewish Center of St. Charles County offers family Shabbat and Holiday celebrations, children’s programming and adult education classes in a relaxed and friendly atmosphere. A popular annual, community-wide event is “Chanukah on Main Street,” an outdoor menorah lighting marking the wintertime holiday of Chanukah.

“We are especially thankful to the City of Saint Charles for encouraging and supporting this event, and especially to Mayor Dan and his staff for embracing our community and helping open this up to the greater public,” said Rabbi Chaim Landa.

WHY ARE RATES INCREASING?

Water: The new water rates incentivize water conservation by using a consumption based tiered rate structure. It also supports the continued operations of the Elm Point Water Treatment Plant, water tanks, pumps, water mains, fire hydrants and other supporting infrastructure. The rates provide funding for capital improvements including new water wells, expansion of the water treatment plant, and replacement of undersized and deteriorated water mains.

New rates are effective on July 1, 2021 and then January 1 of each succeeding year through 2025.

Sewer: The sewer rates support the continued operations of the Mississippi Wastewater Treatment Plant, Missouri Wastewater Treatment Plant, lift stations, force mains, vacuum system, sanitary sewer mains, manholes and other supporting infrastructure. The rates provide funding for capital improvements including wastewater treatment plant updates, lift station updates, replacement of Riverside Drive and South River Road sanitary sewers, and replacement of deteriorated sanitary sewers.

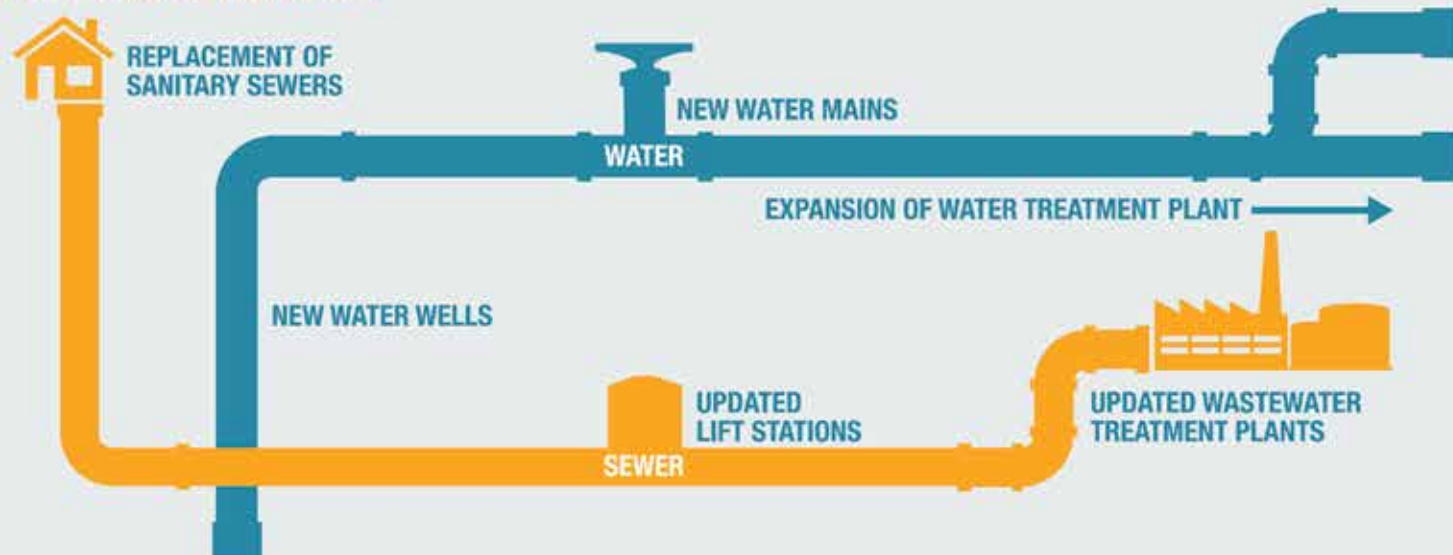

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

The Less You Use, The Less You Pay. This means a low water user will pay less per gallon than a higher water user. Customers using less than 8,000 gallons bi-monthly will pay the cheapest rate. The water rate increases when customers use more than 8,000 gallons or more bi-monthly. The water rate increases again when customers use more than 26,000 gallons or more bi-monthly.

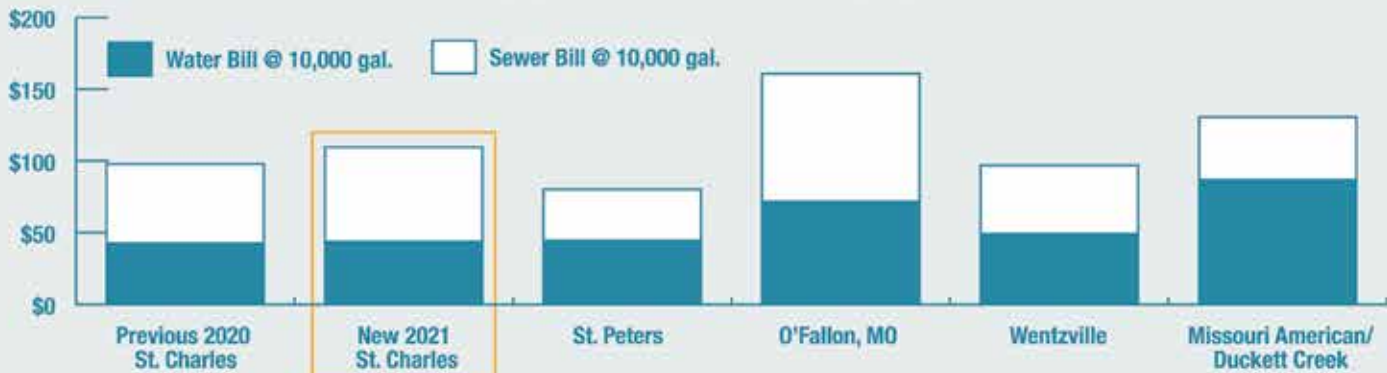
